CITY ESTABLISHES AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST FUND

At the December 16, 2019 Council meeting, the City launched a \$15 million Affordable Housing Trust Fund and approved a \$7 million loan for nonprofit affordable housing developer Aeon to purchase Village Club Apartments. This move immediately preserved 306 units of naturally occurring affordable housing (NOAH) in Bloomington, which are residential rental properties that are affordable without government-subsidized rents.

The City identified a strategy to raise the needed capital for the affordable housing trust fund without placing any financial burden on taxpayers, leveraging existing City resources along with assistance from Old National Bank. This is a significant and innovative investment in retaining economic diversity in Bloomington. Few suburban cities have trust funds dedicated to preserving and creating affordable housing. Hennepin County only recently approved \$15 million for a similar countywide trust fund.

"We are proud to work with the City of Bloomington as it provides groundbreaking leadership to preserve and create affordable housing for all residents," Aeon CEO Alan Arthur said.

The Twin Cities metro area is losing affordable housing faster than new affordable units can be built. Many NOAH properties are being purchased and converted to higher market rate rents. The owners of Village Club Apartments received multiple offers to acquire the property, mainly from national institutional investors likely to raise the rents and potentially displace current renters.

"This process gets at the heart of the difficulty of preserving NOAH properties. Cities and nonprofits typically can't compete with national private market investors. It's not only the risk of being significantly outbid, it's the inability to bring in public funds within the private market timeframe," Community Development Director Eric Johnson said. "Because of our strong commitment to affordable housing preservation, we moved mountains to act immediately to support Aeon in

purchasing this property and securing housing stability for the hard working families who have made Village Club their home."

The City had been working to establish the Affordable Housing Trust Fund in early 2020 under the goals of the opportunity housing ordinance, providing incentives to preserve and develop new affordable housing units while furthering private market development. With Village Club up for sale with a closing deadline of December 27 and 306 NOAH units at risk, the City moved up its timeline in an effort to preserve them.

The Village Club complex is in need of rehabilitation and is considered a challenge due to deferred maintenance. Upon acquisition, Aeon plans to address health and safety repairs first, and then begin rehab.

Aeon will also apply for other public funding to construct up to 300 additional affordable units on the property to assist with long-term stabilization.

Engaged leaders help make a community thrive, and the Bloomington Leadership Program fosters success across our city. Any Bloomington resident 18 years or older can apply to be a part of this free program designed to build leadership opportunities for all communities.

In 2017, the City launched the Bloomington Leadership Program to encourage more diverse populations to apply for commission and board openings. So far, 51 people have taken part in the program.

Participants get to know each other, cultivate a broader understanding of their community and hone leadership skills. All the while, barriers to understanding are broken down, discovery takes place and community building occurs.

Topics cover civic engagement, community leadership, personal leadership development and other engaging exercises. From start to finish, the Bloomington Leadership Program is a fun way to be involved with the community and build leadership skills.

HOW TO GET INVOLVED WITH THE BLOOMINGTON LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

As a Bloomington Leadership Program guest presenter, I enjoyed taking part in a mock city council session where participants took on the roles of city councilmembers, subject matter experts and community members who acted out a scenario to experience what takes place at a regular meeting. For this exercise, I acted as mayor. The mock council voted in favor of an ordinance, and I cast the only dissenting vote. The measure passed. This illustrates how a mayor's legislative power has limits.

Some participants were surprised at the outcome. (They also took the opportunity to remind me in a joking way that the roleplay was a test of my future mayoral dealings.)

These emerging leaders go on to take their skills to new levels. Bloomington Leadership Program alumni have participated in Welcome Meals, the 2020 Census Complete Count Committee, the Lyndale Avenue Retrofit project and other vital community initiatives.

The benefits of the Bloomington Leadership Program are innumerable. I encourage Bloomington residents to get involved and become leaders for a better community.

SAVE THE DATE: MINNESOTA PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY

Make your voice heard in the 2020 presidential primary Tuesday, March 3. Minnesota is one of 15 states and territories that will hold presidential nomination primaries on what is often referred to as Super Tuesday.

On March 3, Bloomington voters may vote at their regular polling places between the hours of 7 a.m. - 8 p.m. To find your polling place, visit blm.mn/pollingplace.

Alternatively, voters may vote by absentee ballot between January 17 and March 2. To cast an absentee ballot in person, visit Bloomington Civic Plaza Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. To cast an absentee ballot by mail visit blm.mn/sos-absentee.

The presidential nomination primary is a unique voting experience as there are two ballots—one for each of the major political parties. Voters must choose which major party ballot they wish to receive and only candidates for the office of U.S. President will be on the ballot. (A separate primary for state offices will be held August 11, 2020.)

Each major party submitted a list of candidates for the party's ballot on December 31, 2019. Those candidates will appear on the ballot even if they drop out of the presidential race before March 3. After the primary, party delegates representing the presidential primary results will carry Minnesotans' preferences forward to the national conventions.

This is Minnesota's first presidential nomination primary since 1992, thanks to a 2016 change in state statute. Voters should note that precinct caucuses will still be held on February 25 to conduct other party business.

BUSINESS EXPANSION TO BRING JOBS, SPACE TECH

Have you heard about Skywater Technology’s addition on 2401 East 86th Street? The 60,000-square-foot expansion that will cut into the existing parking lot, *pictured above*, will house a new clean room where out-of-this-world chips will be produced. The small, radiation-hardened chips are designed to withstand harsh outer space conditions. Much of the funding for the project comes from the U.S. Department of Defense.

The expansion is expected to bring an additional 30 to 50 jobs to Bloomington.

“We’re proud to be leading the way, right here from Bloomington, for the next generation of this critical technology used in defense applications, as well as in medical and space-based communications,” President Thomas Sonderman said.

Skywater designs and develops semiconductors at its Bloomington-based facility and currently employs more than 500 workers.

PARK SYSTEM MASTER PLAN—GET INVOLVED!

LYNDALE AVENUE CORRIDOR DESIGN WORKSHOP

The City is working to bring investment to Lyndale Avenue and provide a walkable, mixed-use corridor that serves as an amenity to attract new, and retain existing, residents and businesses.

You are invited to participate in an interactive three-day planning and design workshop March 2 – 4 to share your ideas for the future of the area. The workshop will be led by Stantec Consulting Services, Inc. in partnership with the City of Bloomington and Hennepin County. This will be a concentrated period of design and planning activities where the team is collaborating directly with the community to ensure all innovative strategies and ideas to solve Lyndale Avenue’s current and future issues are on the table. The workshop will be guided by feedback from the public received over the past three months and will influence a preliminary design for the next phase of the project.

During the workshop, the design team will operate out of an “office” located at 800 West 98th Street in the Clover Center, corner of 98th Street and Lyndale Avenue. The public is welcome to stop by and offer input and feedback, ask questions or simply observe. Periodically, the design team will provide presentations of their work and ask for reactions, ideas and suggestions. The design team will prepare an illustrated report that lays out a clear vision for revitalizing the Lyndale Avenue Corridor, and specific actions and funding strategies to assist the implementation.

JOHNSON RECEIVES RUBINGER FELLOWSHIP

Bloomington Community Development Director Eric Johnson was named a 2020 Rubinger Fellow by the Local Initiative Support Corporation (LISC). Johnson was one of 10 selected in a competitive nationwide process and is the first-ever fellow representing a unit of government.

Fellows meet three times a year and are supported with a network of resources. Johnson will use his fellowship year and resources to research innovative solutions in affordable housing and community development with an emphasis on policy and strategy within redevelopment approaches.

“I’m hoping that what I learn through this fellowship will add more support to team Bloomington as we continue to make our city a community of choice in the Twin Cities region,” Johnson said.

LISC awarded \$40,000 to each fellow to support a special project that addresses critical challenges in rural and urban America. Their overarching goal is to develop innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for people and connect them to the broader economy.



2020 CENSUS COMMITTEE AT WORK

The 2020 Census Complete Count Committee’s work plan is well underway. The committee was spearheaded by the Human Rights Commission and has expanded to become a community-led project. The group has held two meetings the past few months. One was a data-driven meeting with information from the state demographers’ office, and the other was a facilitated conversation to generate action steps that raise Census 2020 awareness in the areas of Bloomington that have been historically hard to count.

HOME ENERGY SQUAD VISIT REMINDER

Want to trim your utility bill? Find out how you can save energy and money with tips from the Home Energy Squad. Residents are encouraged to participate in the energy-efficiency program. EARTH ACTION HERO: AN ELECTRIC CAR SPARKS CHANGE

Owning an electric car adds a lot of advantages with only an occasional charge for City of Bloomington's Fleet Manager Michael Keim, *above left*, and Accounting Assistant Joan Keim, *above right*. Two years ago, the Bloomington couple bought an electric car. They enjoy the financial and environmental benefits an electric car offers.

For the Keims, charging a car with an electric plug is easy at home in the garage. Electric power generation is a sustainable advantage.

"Step out of your comfort zone and into an electric car," Michael said. "Don't be scared of the change. Electronic cars are very nice to drive and the technology is proven."

As fleet manager for the City's more than 500 vehicles, Michael knows his cars (and trucks) and how things run on the road under all conditions in all seasons.

The car's range is well suited for city driving. Current electric car models have a range of 150 – 250 miles. The ride is quiet and smooth with no engine vibrations. The car's torque provides plenty of responsive power. Brakes last longer because they are regenerative. With no gas, oil changes or tuneups, lifetime cost of ownership is less than a traditional car even taking the higher purchase price into account.

CURBSIDE CLEANUP STUDY RELEASED

Many Bloomington residents participate in the annual spring Curbside Cleanup program. A new study determined the amount of reusable and recyclable material that is disposed of as part of the Cleanup. The information will be used to better understand the environmental impact of the program, and to identify options for disposing of bulky items in more environmentally sustainable ways. In the current program, appliances and brush are collected during the cleanup for recycling. The rest of the items are collected for disposal as garbage.

The City Council requested the Bloomington Sustainability Commission look at the Curbside Cleanup program. A working group contracted with consultant, Foth, to conduct a waste characterization audit. A team of 20 dedicated volunteers and City staff helped carry out the study. The team went out early each Saturday morning during last year's Cleanup to study what items were in the piles for haulers to collect. The team looked at piles at more than 2,000 households across the city, with more than 19,000 items inventoried.

"The study looked at what was going into the Curbside Cleanup piles and found that many of the materials being left out on the curb could be reused." Public Works Project Manager Laura Horner said. "The program is not only expensive, it adds to growing environmental concerns about landfill expansion."

The Sustainability Commission is considering more environmentally efficient ways to handle bulky items in the future. While change may come, this year's Cleanup will not see adjustments.

DONATE AND RECYCLE ITEMS INSTEAD OF SETTING THEM ON THE CURB

While February may not be the time you normally think about spring cleaning, remember that you can donate or recycle any time of year. Except for large appliances and brush, items collected at the curb by the haulers during Curbside cleanup end up in the landfill.

Several local charity organizations accept donated materials. Guidelines on what is acceptable vary by organization and sometimes by time of year. Most clean, gently-used items in good working order are suitable for donation, but check with the organization to be sure.

HOW THINGS WORK: A RECIPE FOR ANTI-ICING

Anti-icing prepares streets for inclement weather. Before snow and ice accumulates, the anti-icing process begins. A brine mixture is used to coat street surfaces. Public Works custom mixes a brine solution to maximize melting power. Sometimes beet and corn extracts are used along with salt. The formula for the mix is contingent on the condition of the roads, the weather forecast and other variables.

The amount of salt needed to clear roadways is reduced when anti-icing is applied. Reducing chlorides is a sustainable practice in keeping with the City Council's strategic priority for environmental sustainability.

PUBLIC HEALTH HELPS YOUNG FAMILIES

Bloomington Public Health nurses have provided home visiting to families for more than 40 years in the cities of Bloomington, Edina and Richfield. When Public Health expanded its home visiting services in 2007, it joined partner agencies to form the Metro Alliance for Healthy Families. Since then, 178 Bloomington families have enrolled, receiving 7,224 home visits.

Through this partnership, Public Health is able to offer Healthy Families America (HFA)—an evidence-based home visiting model program. Research shows that HFA home visiting helps improve the health and well-being of women, children, and families as well as increasing school readiness.

Those who receive HFA service are either pregnant or parenting new babies. The goal of the home visiting program is to promote healthy pregnancy, early childhood development and long-term health outcomes through discussion with a nurse. Families can enroll in the program during pregnancy or within three months after the birth of a baby. Enrollees receive weekly home visits for the first 6 – 18 months and continue with decreasing frequency up to age four.

AT YOUR SERVICE: JOHN CARLSON

For Bloomington Animal Control Coordinator John Carlson, there's a wild side to the average work day. He's seen it all—from ferrets and chickens to puppies and kittens—during his more than 20 years in animal control.

"We really handle just about anything animal," he said. "And when it's not in our wheelhouse I always try to refer people to someone who can help. For example, we'd work with the Raptor Center for a wounded hawk."

In his day-to-day duties, Carlson answers resident questions and manages the 400 – 600 animals that come into the shelter each year. He works closely with local animal rescues and hospice programs to place as many animals as possible in new homes. He also does the work it takes to maintain the animal shelter, including cleaning, ordering supplies and doing administrative things like fielding calls and filing adoption applications.

"Everything I do is about helping animals when they're in need," Carlson said. "Finding ways to give animals a second chance at life or getting them back to their owners—that's the reward."



SEEKING BUSINESS NOMINATIONS

Returning to work after having a baby can be jarring. Having a supportive employer can make all the difference. Employers who provide breaks for pumping breast milk in a private space and make a woman feel supported result in healthier, happier and more productive employees.

Last August, the City Council recognized nine businesses nominated by one or more employees as breastfeeding supportive. The City wants to once again recognize local businesses that support their employees to continue to successfully provide breast milk for their babies after returning to work.

A plot measuring 10 by 15 feet costs \$41 (\$51 for nonresidents) for the season (May – October) with a maximum of three plots per renter.


BLOOMINGTON YESTERDAY OLD CEDAR AVENUE BRIDGE

The bridge at the endpoint of Old Cedar Avenue South of Bloomington has come to be known by more than one name. The Old Cedar Avenue bridge is also called the Long Meadow Lake bridge. Sometimes, the name is incorrectly shortened to the Cedar Avenue bridge (really the name of the bridge at Highway 77, constructed in 1980, just downstream and to the east.)

Confused? Let history be your guide. After the demolition of a circa-1890s wooden bridge, Hennepin County constructed a metal bridge over Long Meadow Lake in 1920. It carried vehicle traffic from Old Cedar Avenue South for 73 years. In 2002, it was closed to all pedestrian and vehicle traffic.

After extensive renovation, in November 2018, the Old Cedar Avenue bridge reopened for bicycle and pedestrian traffic. Today, it serves as a recreational link across Long Meadow Lake. Other enhancements include an expanded parking lot and restrooms.

With the newly renovated bridge and updated amenities, there's much to celebrate. Save the date for the Old Cedar Avenue Area celebration planned for Saturday, June 6.




