APRIL

Spinning Your Wheels on the Frontier Saturday April 2, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Card wool and spin it with a drop spindle, treadle a spinning wheel, and learn about natural dyes from Pauline Bold, an expert in hand spinning. Then make your own bracelet or necklace to take home. All supplies provided.

Learn Dakota!

Saturday April 9, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

During tours of the historic Pond House hear about the work Gideon and Samuel did in creating the first Dakota alphabet, see resources for learning the Dakota language today, and learn about the annual Dakota Language Camp and free weekly language classes.

Stereoscopes & Thaumatropes

Saturday April 16, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Look through a stereoscope at dozens of 19th century photos to see the world in VR as the Pond family saw it. Then use simple household items and your creativity to make a thaumatrope to take home. Behold the optical illusion of superimposed images that intrigued frontier children.

Whirring Wonders

Saturday April 23, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Tops have amused children and fascinated adults for centuries. Now you can try spinning a variety of tops and decorate your own wooden top to take home. Challenge a friend to a game of dueling tops!

Mini Log Cabins

Saturday April 30, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Create your own mini log cabin using dowel "logs" and a cardboard box! Learn about frontier construction, and hear stories about the Pond brothers' first log cabin at Bde Maka Ska (Lake Calhoun) and their first log Mission House in Bloomington.

MAY

Mystery House Tours

Saturday May 7, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Examine the historic Pond House as a history detective! What are the mysterious markings on the bricks, why is the window glass wavy, and why is there a door on every side of the house? Answer these curious questions to win a detective gadget.

Lakota Astronomy Sunday May 8, 2 pm

Prof. Mark Hollabaugh will explore astronomy of the Lakota culture and their observations of meteors and eclipses visible from Minnesota and the Dakotas. He is author of *The Spirit and the Sky: Lakota Visions of the Cosmos*, and taught astronomy and physics for 25 years at Normandale Community College. This talk will be followed by commentary from a Dakota cultural expert.

Braid a Mini Rug

Saturday May 14, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Try out this frontier craft while making your own coaster-sized "rug" to take home. Choose fabric strips, learn to braid them, then hand stitch your braid into a mini rug. All materials provided.

Log Cabin Building

Saturday May 21, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Build a kid-sized log cabin! Assemble pre-cut, notched timbers to create a 4' high frontier home. Can you figure out where each log goes? Learn about the ingenious compound angled dovetail joinery that was used to lock the log corners together.

Jumping Jacks Saturday May 28, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

A favorite toy for frontier children, Jumping Jacks are flat figures whose joints are connected to a pull string. Pull the string and the Jumping Jack will dance. Now you can make your own vintage Jumping Jack to take home! All materials provided.

JUNE

Seen and Not Heard! Saturday June 4, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Keeping children quiet during long frontier church services was a challenge. Solution: Church Babies! These simple dolls helped relieve Sunday morning boredom for kids. Make your own doll using a handkerchief and household items. All supplies provided.

Dakota Storytelling Sunday June 5, 2 pm

Dr. Teresa Peterson, a Sisseton Wahpeton Dakota, will discuss her book *Voices from Pejuhutazizi: Dakota Stories and Storytellers*. Through five generations at Pejuhutazizi, Peterson's family has told stories of events, migrations, and relationships in Dakota history, and stories that carry Dakota culture through tales, legends, and myths.

Frontier Game Day Saturday June 11, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Try your hand at outdoor games such as walking on stilts, Graces, stick-and-hoop, and marbles. Experience frontier fun. Challenge your family to a friendly competition! Bragging rights will be awarded.

Prairies and Pollinators Saturday June 18, Drop-in program 1-4 pm

Prairies and pollinators have both played incredibly important roles in Minnesota for thousands of years. Join a naturalist from Nature Enthusiations to look for pollinators and other insects, learn a little about how Minnesota's prairies have changed over time, and make a project to help the pollinators in our area.


John Philip Sousa Memorial Band Free Concert Sunday June 19, 7 pm

Interpretive signs describing the history of the Dakota in the Minnesota River Valley, and Gideon and Samuel Pond, missionaries who arrived in 1834, are located along the walking trails in the park. The 1856 Gideon and Agnes Pond House is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The park is open daily until 10 pm.
