




Five Town Hall Forums Hosted by City Council

Fire:

2023 Budget has significant investment in Police and Fire

Adding 3 new full-time firefighters half-way through 2023 along with the 18 that will be added with the SAFER Grant in early 2023.

Police:

Adding 2 new police officers in January 2023 and 2 in June 2023 along with a new dispatch training coordinator.



Since the Preliminary 2023 Tax Levy was set...

We received the SAFER Grant (Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response) that pays for 18 full-time fire fighters for three years.

Lodging and Admission tax revenues have improved, and the 2023 forecast was increased by \$308K (still at 92% of 2019 revenues).

Permit revenue analysis has increased 2023 forecast by \$836K.

With new credit card policy, Building and Inspections was able to reduce expenses by \$75,000 that had been previously been budgeted to cover credit card processing fees.



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

\$8.60 (85%) of this increase is an investment in police and fire.

Cities - The 2023 preliminary property tax levies for cities will total approximately \$3.214 billion compared with a final levy of \$2.946 billion in 2022, a 9.1% increase.

Counties - The 2023 preliminary property tax levies for counties will total approximately \$3.781 billion compared with a final levy of \$3.605 billion in 2022, a 4.9% increase.

Townships - The 2023 preliminary property tax levies for townships will total approximately \$296 million compared with a final levy of \$285 million in 2022, a 3.9% increase.

Schools - The 2023 preliminary property tax levies for schools will total approximately \$3.726 billion compared with a final levy of \$3.484 billion in 2022, a 6.9% increase.

Special Taxing Districts - The 2023 preliminary property tax levies for special taxing districts will total approximately \$461 million compared with a final levy of \$440 million in 2022, a 4.8% increase.



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
State of Minnesota - Property Tax Refund (Form M1PR)

Minnesota homeowners and renters may qualify for a Property Tax Refund. The Refund provides property tax relief depending on your income and property taxes.

State of Minnesota - Property Tax Refund (Form M1PR)

- Available for both Homeowners and Renters
- Due date is August 15.
- You may file up to one year after the due date.
- Two types available:

Regular Property Tax Refund

- Compares property taxes versus your total household income
- Renter income less than \$64,920; Homeowner less than \$119,790

Special Property Tax Refund

- Increase in taxes beyond State set level
- For 2021 to 2022: increase of 12% and at least \$100 increase.

State of Minnesota - Property Tax Refund (Form M1PR)

Additional subtractions can help to qualify or increase refund amounts

- Dependents
- 65 or older
- Contributions to a retirement account
- Permanent or total disability
