INVESTING IN OUR COMMUNITY A look at priorities

fince 2021, hundreds of community members and City staff have worked together to create a five-year strategic plan, a mission to guide the City in cultivating an enduring and remarkable community where people want to be. Addressing Bloomington's aging resources became a key objective, and three projects emerged as top priorities to be renewed, upgraded or replaced. They include:

NINE MILE CREEK CORRIDOR RENEWAL

• Need: The City's 2022 Natural Resources Prioritization and Management Strategies ranked Nine Mile Creek and Moir/Central Park as the highest priority for restoration.

• Benefits: This major natural resource would be restored and year-round recreational opportunities would be increased.

BLOOMINGTON ICE GARDEN UPGRADE

• Need: This popular facility needs modernization and major updates to mechanical systems, including refrigeration for all three ice sheets.





• Benefits: The upgrade would improve guest experience and make it possible to continue ice rental and hosting dozens of tournaments and figure skating events annually.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND CREEKSIDE COMMUNITY CENTER BUILDING REPLACEMENT

• Need: These obsolete buildings do not meet the needs of the communities they serve.

• Benefits: Combining them into one facility would provide a more effective environment to deliver vital health, fitness and recreational services as well as social activities.



POTENTIAL FUNDING FOR IDENTIFIED PROJECTS

Sales and property taxes are two primary ways to pay for community improvements. The estimated cost for all three projects is \$155 million. Here's the estimated cost for each funding option:

- Sales tax option, mentioned above, would cost \$70 \$105 annually for each of Bloomington's 42,000 households.
- Property tax option would cost \$230 annually for each property owner of a median value home in Bloomington. For more information about these projects, visit blm.mn/invest.



MAYOR'S MEMO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN BLOOMINGTON

ou might recall that last fall the City Council approved restructuring the Housing and Redevelopment Authority and the Port Authority in a way that refocused their work to better serve Bloomington's housing and economic development goals.

For three decades, the Bloomington Port Authority has been a successful economic development agency that works to expand the city's tax base, promote and attract quality job opportunities, and support real estate redevelopment and economic development.

The restructuring—which was the result of an analysis done by an outside consultant—expands the Port Authority's focus on business development, expansion and retention. It also restructures the division to support these priorities.

I think it goes without saying that business development, expansion and retention are vital parts of cultivating an enduring and remarkable community where people want to be. The Port Authority's role is just one part of an overall City strategy to build and strengthen our business community.

Regionally, Bloomington has an active role in the Minneapolis Regional Chamber of Commerce. The City was an original investor in Greater MSP, a regional economic development partnership, and we work almost daily with the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development.

Closer to home, City staff and elected officials work very closely with the Bloomington Convention and Visitors Bureau to ensure the strength of the hospitality industry. We partner with Hennepin County and the Metropolitan Council whenever possible. And I'm sure you've heard that we're in the process of creating a small business development center on the city's east side, *see page 3*.

We also acknowledge that Bloomington is part of a global economy. Bloomington is active with the Minneapolis/St. Paul foreign trade zone. We've hosted Hiroshi Tajima, the consul general of Japan, and in February I attended an event in Chicago at the consulate general's office. Last year, I was proud to be part of an event with the German American Chamber of Commerce. And of course, if we land Expo 2027, it will affirm that our reach is truly global.

With a strong and stable economy, good transportation infrastructure in place, and a hardworking, well-educated workforce, we know that Bloomington is a great place to do business. I feel good about the existing and growing efforts we have in place to tell that good story to businesses both big and small. We have seen results—SICK Industries locating their North American headquarters here is the most recent example—but like a lot of our work, this is a marathon, not a sprint. I'm confident that our steady, systematic work will continue to pay off for Bloomington in terms of jobs and economic development for years to come.

Expo 2027 decision coming June 21

Bloomington is one of five sites around the world being considered as the location for Expo 2027. An expo is a world's fair, a months-long event in which countries unveil and showcase their most remarkable achievements. In June, the Bureau of International Expositions will select a site.

In March, the Minnesota USA Expo bid committee hosted a symposium in Paris to show people what makes Bloomington a great candidate to host Expo 2027.

The international campaign is a joint effort between the Expo 2027 bid committee and the United States federal government. Minnesota USA Expo 2027 is an independent nonprofit organization established to coordinate the bid process and, if successful, to plan and host the event. The organization is not affiliated with or governed by the City of Bloomington. Mayor Tim Busse and City Manager Jamie Verbrugge serve as ex officio members of the Minnesota USA Expo 2027 board of directors.

EARNED SICK AND SAFE LEAVE ORDINANCE GOES INTO EFFECT JULY 2023

A new earned sick and safe leave ordinance affecting employees of Bloomington businesses begins July 1, 2023. Under the new ordinance:

- Businesses with five or more employees must grant employees a minimum of one hour of paid sick and safe leave for every 30 hours they work, up to a maximum of 48 hours annually.
 - Employers with fewer than five employees must grant unpaid leave and can choose to provide paid leave.

• Current employees will be able to use accrued time as soon as they have accrued it. New employees will be able to start using their accrued time 90 days after they begin employment. For example, employees hired July 1 can use accrued time beginning October 1, 2023.



The planning process started in fall 2021 with community events during which residents and stakeholders shared their visions for the future of Bloomington. A core team of community members and City staff set the course for the plan. Action teams identified steps to take to achieve the goals. The work resulted in a mission: To cultivate an enduring and remarkable community where people want to be.

Working from this mission and the core values, strategic objectives and strategies created by the community members who took part in the planning process, City staff built created by the community-based planning groups, City staff built a measurable work plan in late 2022. The plan has three priority areas—a connected, welcoming community; a healthy community; and a community with equitable economic growth—along with nine desired outcomes and 27 initiatives.

he small business development center advisory committee has driven community engagement efforts on this project. The results have shaped the vision for the project, including programming, resources and design. The group met from June 2022 through April 2023. Now the team is extending its outreach to the neighborhood and wider community. The goal is to learn from neighbors about the qualities and stories that make the neighborhood special, which will inform future placemaking installations and build awareness of the project and new connections to it. ver wonder what happens to your food scraps and other organic material like paper towels and greasy pizza boxes that you put in your curbside organics cart?

For Bloomington residents, the material is sent to the Shakopee Mdewakanton Sioux Community's Organics Recycling Facility where it is combined with yard waste and composted. There it breaks down into a soil-like product called finished compost.

To close the loop, the City is giving away the nutrient-rich finished compost at no cost. Often, these items are still in good condition for someone else to use or have components that could be recycled. When these items are picked up during Curbside Cleanup, they end up in a landfill.

To help keep these items out of the garbage, the City is launching a new curbside program for reuse and recycling of many bulky, hard-to-manage items. The service will offer residents a once-a-month opportunity for a limited quantity of items to be picked up for reuse and recycling. 

Aking friends comes easily to Edward Adamski, a 95-year-old World War II Navy veteran who is always up for a game of cards or giving people rides to appointments or to run errands. Age is no barrier for this Bloomington resident. "When you grow up in the Depression, you learn to help people," Adamski shared. "You would be surprised at how many friends you can have."

Adamski may be nearing a century, but that isn't slowing him down. A resident of Bloomington for the past 20 years, he is a regular at Creekside Community Center's Monday canasta games and, if asked, readily shares his lengthy daily to-do list.

Resident and friend Chris Uting is inspired by Adamski and what she sees in him. "Bloomington should be very proud of having such a resident. Those of us who live in the same building with him depend on him for many things. He has helped numerous residents and our community in many ways."

UPDATES

In 2021, the City adopted a new Park System Master Plan, which reflects about two years of public input on priorities for Bloomington parks. Last August, City staff consulted residents for input on plans for nine parks: Brookside, Bryant, Kelly, Poplar Bridge, Running, Smith, Sunrise Southwood and Tretbaugh.
