### CITY'S FIRST JUNETEENTH CELEBRATION A SUCCESS

ive music, food trucks and fun were in full swing at Kennedy High School during Bloomington's first-ever Juneteenth celebration. Juneteenth is a holiday celebrated on June 19 to commemorate the emancipation of the last enslaved people in ■the United States, which occurred in Texas on June 19, 1865, years after the 1862 Emancipation Proclamation. The event was produced by New Life Church and the City of Bloomington Black Employee Network and sponsored by Bloomington Creative Placemaking.

"It was wonderful seeing so many people come out to celebrate this year at Bloomington's first Juneteenth event," HRA Administrator and Bloomington Black Employee Network cochair Aarica Coleman said. #### ALL SEVEN CITY COUNCIL SEATS UP FOR ELECTION THIS YEAR

his year, all city council seats and the mayor are up for election. On the ballot on November 7, voters will elect a mayor and six councilmembers — one for each of the four districts, one at large and another two-year term at-large seat.

"Our records show this is the first time in Bloomington's history that the entire seven-person council has been on the ballot at the same time," City Clerk Christina Scipioni said.

Due to redistricting that occurred in 2022, all four council district seats will be on the ballot. The candidates elected to Districts 1 and 2 will serve two-year terms. Candidates elected to Districts 3 and 4 will serve four-year terms. The special election for councilmember at-large is due to the vacancy created when former City Councilmember Nathan Coulter was elected to the state legislature. There will also be three ballot questions about local option sales tax, read more on page 3 under Bloomington Forward.

Three Bloomington school board members are also up for election. Visit blm.mn/vote for more information.

#### RANKED CHOICE VOTING: HOW IT WORKS

anked choice voting allows voters to rank candidates in order of preference—first, second and third choice. This is a voting Resystem that removes the need for a primary election.

Ballots may be counted in one or more rounds. In the first round, only first-choice votes are tallied. If no candidate has won a majority of the votes (more than 50%), then the candidate with the least number of first-choice votes is eliminated. All the firstchoice votes for the eliminated candidate are also eliminated. Voters who picked the eliminated candidate as their first choice will have their second-choice vote counted instead.

This process repeats until one candidate has won a majority or until only two candidates remain. For more information, visit blm.mn/vote.

### **MAYOR'S MEMO** NO EXPO, BUT BLOOMINGTON'S FUTURE IS BRIGHT

y now you know: the U.S., specifically Minnesota and Bloomington, lost its bid to host Expo 2027. That means our city will not be hosting the World's Fair that year. I would like to congratulate all of the finalist countries that were in the running and Serbia for being chosen as the host of Expo 2027.

Of course, we're disappointed, but I'd like to tell you how proud I am of our exceptional efforts and offer a few insights on what we've gained in the process.

First, to use a baseball metaphor, you can't get a run without taking a swing. My friends, over the years Bloomington has scored runs—home runs. And we will in the future, but to do so we have to keep swinging.

For decades, Bloomington has been a leader in supporting—and completing—large, successful projects. We have had, and currently have, forward-thinking leaders and partners who continue to be innovators and who think big and bold.

Much of our current development is a product of that way of thinking, including Mall of America, which is not only a

success in itself, but led to light rail and other significant spinoff developments and major transit investments in our city. We placed a bet on Bloomington with the Expo bid, and though we didn't win, we have been successful. Here's how.

The world now knows about Bloomington, Minnesota. The two-year effort for the bid has introduced Bloomington to people from many countries and their leaders. Thousands of people who were not aware of us before now know what we have to offer.

With every connection we made, we strengthened our relationships—on the world's stage, locally and nationally—with key partners at the White House, the State Department, the Department of Commerce, the Minnesota Governor's Office and many others.

We also raised awareness of Bloomington in the development community, which will help us take advantage of the many exciting opportunities for redevelopment—not only for property in South Loop but citywide. Bloomington is a critical contributor to the economic success of the region. The most significant economic activity in recent years has been the continual work of building the South Loop District. The fact that we have large, available, developable sites in South Loop means Bloomington is attractive to developers and well positioned for the future.

We didn't get the Expo, but the future is bright for Bloomington. We took a swing. We gave it our best shot. In true Bloomington fashion, we set the stage for more exciting things to come.

#### EMPLOYERS ARE REQUIRED TO PROVIDE EARNED SICK AND SAFE LEAVE

new ordinance requiring Bloomington employers to provide their employees earned sick and safe leave took effect July 1. Here's the breakdown:

EMPLOYER SIZE	SICK AND SAFE LEAVE HOURS REQUIRED	Pay for sick and safe leave hours
Five or more employees	1 hour for every 30 hours worked	Required
Fewer than five employees	1 hour for every 30 hours worked	Up to employer

Employees who have been employed for at least 90 days will be able to use accrued time as soon as they have accrued it. As part of the ordinance, accrued and available hours must be listed on employee paystubs. For more information about the ordinance, visit blm.mn/essl.

## BLOOMINGTON FORWARD: INVESTING IN OUR COMMUNITY

he City launched a new website—BloomingtonForward.org—to inform voters about a proposed half-percent local sales tax that would be an investment in community amenities designed to bring residents together and enhance quality of life.

#### THREE MAJOR PROJECTS ARE INCLUDED IN THE PROPOSAL

- A new community health and wellness center to replace the Bloomington Public Health and Creekside Community Center buildings and be located on the same site as the Creekside Community Center, 9801 Penn Avenue South.
- Renovation of the 50-year-old Bloomington Ice Garden, 3600 98th Street West, including new refrigeration and mechanical systems, improved accessibility, a new roof and additional renovations to improve user experience.
- Enhancements and protections for the Nine Mile Creek Corridor and Moir/Central Park with improved trails, restored riverbanks, habitat protections and new park amenities to support outdoor recreation.

#### NEXT STEPS

As part of the election on Tuesday, November 7, Bloomington voters will consider three separate ballot questions—one for each of the three projects in the Bloomington Forward plan. If voters approve any of the ballot questions, a half-percent citywide sales tax will be authorized to fund the approved projects. To learn more, visit BloomingtonForward.org.

The Bloom in Bloomington internship program launched in May. In its pilot year, Bloom in Bloomington has placed 12 interns, *pictured at right*, at positions within the City of Bloomington, Mall of America and the law firm Larkin Hoffman.

Bloom in Bloomington is a youth workforce development program offering young people aged 16 – 24 summer internship experiences. This unique, forward-thinking program offers interns the opportunity to gain career skills and learn more about a variety of work they've not had the chance to experience before. working with the City, was integral in planning and launching the Bloom in Bloomington program.

"This is a first-year program. So now local employers are going to know the City of Bloomington is looking to develop young people," Mayowa said. "Employers can begin having these talks, if they haven't already. How can we make our workplace accessible? How can we make space in our organization for young people and people of diverse backgrounds? These are important conversations."

### ROADWORK HAS BEGUN: 1-35W AND 1-494

The multiyear I-494 project is in full swing. Bloomington residents are seeing construction on I-494 and East Bush Lake Road for E-ZPass lanes and in the southeast quad of I-35W/I-494 interchange.

Drivers will be able to travel on I-494 through the duration of the project, but should watch for:

- Weekend, nighttime, and directional closures along both I-494 and I-35W.
- Ramps and loop closures.
- Lane and road closures on local roadways near I-494.
- Traffic separation from northbound I-35W to eastbound and westbound I-494.

#### CONSTRUCTION HIGHLIGHTS: WHAT'S BEING BUILT

- A new turbine interchange ramp from northbound I-35W to westbound I-494.
- E-ZPass lanes on I-494 between East Bush Lake Road and I-35W.
- Reconstruction of three bridges east of Lyndale in preparation for future I-494 E-ZPass lanes.
- Construction of a new pedestrian bridge over I-494 at Chicago Avenue (between Portland and 12th).

# DO CURBSIDE PLASTIC RECYCLABLES GET RECYCLED?

Recently, there have been claims that most plastics do not get recycled. It is true that many plastic items cannot be recycled due to their size or low market value. However, items accepted for recycling in Bloomington's curbside program have value and are being recycled.

Accepted plastics are sorted at metro recycling facilities and sold, primarily in the Midwest or North America to companies that create new products from recycled material.

#### YOU CAN HELP!

First, reduce the number of plastic items purchased, and second, only put accepted items in recycling containers. Here's a breakdown:

Recycle: Empty plastic containers #1, #2 and #5 (numbers will be on the bottom of the container) which includes bottles, jugs, tubs, cups and takeout containers. Give items a quick rinse. They do not need to be perfectly clean. Keep the caps on.

**DO NOT recycle:** Black plastic, plastic bags or film, bubble wrap, Styrofoam, #3, #4, #6 or #7 plastic or any container that held hazardous waste.

- Toys: sensory and learning toys, books, bath and pool toys, stroller attachments, etc.
- Engagement: activity centers, play yards, walkers, swings, bouncers.
- Miscellaneous: highchairs, booster chairs, diaper bags, etc.

Please do not bring car seats, cribs, clothes, stuffed animals, feeding items, large furniture or play structures, toys for children over two years old or anything broken or recalled.

### CITY RECOGNIZED WITH SUSTAINABLE CITY AWARD

he City of Bloomington recently received a Sustainable
City Award for the implementation of a new bulky item
management program. Each year, the League of Minnesota
Cities recognizes cities for their work in achieving their sustainability
goals by using one or more of the GreenStep Cities program's 29
best practices.

"Bloomington was specifically recognized for resident involvement in the program's development and implementation, and for developing an effective solution to the challenge of bulky item management," said Ellen Biales, the deputy director of Public Works.

The new bulky item management program includes:

- Every other year spring curbside collection of bulky items for collection as garbage.
- Regular monthly curbside collection of reusable and recyclable bulky items.
  - An annual recycling drop-off event.
  - Community swap events.

#### GREENSTEP CITIES

Bloomington participates in Minnesota GreenStep Cities, a voluntary challenge, assistance and recognition program to help cities achieve sustainability and quality-of-life goals. Bloomington's sustainability efforts have earned the City Step 5 recognition—the highest level of recognition in the program.

### FULL SPEED AHEAD FOR ELECTRIC VEHICLE INFRASTRUCTURE PLANNING

The automotive world is rapidly being electrified. Meeting that future head on, the City has been engaging with agencies, businesses and residents, both online and in public forums to gather input for a plan to integrate electric vehicles (EV) into the city's infrastructure.

"The Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Plan will provide the City with a roadmap for implementing the infrastructure needed to support electric vehicles across a variety of applications," said Public Works Development Coordinator Brian Hansen.

Along with public and professional input, the comprehensive EV Infrastructure Plan for Bloomington will include current EV facilities inventory and a review of regulatory frameworks to understand what works best for Bloomington.

The plan will continue development throughout 2023 and be presented at a public open house before going to the City Council for consideration by the end of 2023.

#### MEET A FIREFIGHTER: JOE ZINNIEL

t is no surprise that Bloomington Fire Department's Station 3 Captain Joe Zinniel was drawn to fire service. His father was the fire chief in Sleepy Eye, Minnesota, where Joe grew up.

"To me, fire service is the best job in the world," Joe said.

After graduating from college, Joe gravitated toward fire service and emergency medical service. He began his fire career as a paid, on-call firefighter at the Bloomington Fire Department in 2016 and received paramedic certification in 2017. He also worked four years with the South Metro Fire Department serving South St. Paul and West St. Paul.

In his free time, Joe enjoys fishing, hunting, and of course, spending time with his family. He and his wife, Amy, have a one-year-old son, named Otto. Will Otto grow into public service?

"I will encourage him to pursue what excites and interests him," Zinniel said. "Obviously, there will be a lot of fire service influence on him growing up, but his mother will likely want him to be a financial advisor like her!"

#### JOE'S FIRE SAFETY ADVICE

"Close before you doze. In the event of a fire in your home, a closed bedroom door could save your life and give the fire department time to rescue you."

### **HAVE SAFE RECREATIONAL FIRES**

recreational fire is an outdoor fire used for cooking, warming or ceremonial purposes. When having a recreational fire in your yard, remember to use common sense, be considerate of your neighbors and follow the City Code.

- Recreational fires may only be conducted between 7 a.m. and midnight when the wind speed is under 10 miles per hour. If a City official determines that a fire is creating a safety hazard, it must be extinguished immediately.
- Fires must be located at least 25 feet away from any structures or combustible materials. Fires must be constantly attended by a responsible person within sight of the flames until the fire burns out completely or is extinguished.
  - Have fire extinguishing equipment readily available.
- Burning wood that has leaves or needles, or wood that is rotten, wet or treated with paint or glue is prohibited by ordinance. Only use dry, clean wood such as cordwood or Presto logs.
  - Fire stacks must not exceed three feet wide by two feet high.

### **PREVENT AUTO THEFT**

Bloomington Police suggest following these tips to lower the chance of auto theft.

• Take your keys.

Approximately one in five vehicles is stolen with the keys in it.

- Never hide a spare key in your car. Spare keys are easily found; thieves know where to look.
- Lock your car. Nearly half of vehicles stolen are left unlocked.
- Never leave your car's engine running. Vehicles are commonly stolen from gas stations, convenience stores and driveways.
- Completely close all windows when parking. Don't make it easier for the thief to steal.
- Don't leave valuables in plain view. You become a target for theft. Purses, laptops and other electronics are top targets for thieves. If you must leave valuables in your vehicle, lock them in the trunk before you reach your destination.
- Install visible or audible alert devices. These can include audible alarms, steering wheel locks, wheel locks, theft deterrent decals, etc. These devices can deter a crime or increase the time needed to steal your car.

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### **BLOOMINGTON YESTERDAY: CIVIC PLAZA TURNS 20**

his year marks the 20th anniversary of Civic Plaza being built. The facility houses Police and City administrative functions, along with the Bloomington Center for the Arts, 1800 West Old Shakopee Road. This photo shows the construction of the 30-foot cedar columns outside Civic Plaza's west entrance. The 34 columns mimic a marble colonnade that might stand outside of a traditional government building. However, these columns are made of wood to reflect the natural environment of Bloomington. ### **BLOOMINGTON AND IZUMI CELEBRATE 30 YEARS AS SISTER CITIES**

Bloomington and Izumi, Japan, will mark 30 years as sister cities when student and mayoral delegations arrive to celebrate on August 11. The visiting delegation and Bloomington hosts will bridge cultural divides during days filled with activities including visits to Civic Plaza, the state capital and even a St. Paul Saints game.

The Bloomington-Izumi Sister City program became official in 1993 when Bloomington Mayor Neil Peterson visited Izumi and signed the agreement with Mayor Ikeda. In 1994, Bloomington hosted Mayor Ikeda, 10 members of Izumi's city council members and the first student exchange program.

Letter exchanges kept the relationship vibrant during the pandemic. The cities resumed connecting in-person this year with the arrival of a Japanese mayoral delegation, a delegation of marathon athletes, six students and two chaperones.

"As a Toro employee, I visited Japan several times a year. I have come to believe that the most effective way to bridge cultural differences is through knowledge and interaction," said Billy Secord, who is also a Bloomington Sister City Organization (BSCO) board member.
