

INVESTING IN OUR COMMUNITY

After years of gathering input from community members, the City developed a long-term investment plan, Bloomington

Forward, that would support three major community projects for better health, wellness, athletics, recreation and improved natural areas. Voters are being asked to consider a half-percent local option sales tax to fund three projects. Read more about the proposed sales

BLOOMINGTON FORWARD AT A GLANCE

n Tuesday, November 7, Bloomington voters will consider a half-percent local option sales tax to finance \$155 million in bonds to pay for three projects. They include:

New community health and wellness center

Need: Creekside Community Center and the Public Health building are obsolete and do not meet the needs of the communities they serve.

Benefits: Combining them into a new community health and wellness center would provide a more effective environment to deliver vital health, fitness and recreational services, senior programs and social activities. The new facility would be where Creekside is now, 9801 Penn Avenue South.

Cost: \$101.8 million. (The City has already received approval of \$1.8 million from the State of Minnesota for predesign work.)

BLOOMINGTON ICE GARDEN RENOVATION

Need: This popular facility needs modernization and major updates to mechanical systems, including refrigeration for all three ice sheets.

Benefits: The upgrade would improve guest experience and make it possible to continue ice rental and hosting dozens of tournaments and figure skating events annually.

Cost: \$37.27 million. (The City has already received approval of \$2.27 million from the State of Minnesota for predesign work.)

NINE MILE CREEK CORRIDOR RENEWAL

Need: The Nine Mile Creek corridor is vulnerable. If approved, the sales tax would provide critical investments to enhance and preserve the corridor by restoring riverbanks, wetlands and wooded areas, protecting habitat and removing invasive species. Other improvements would include outdoor recreation amenities, such as an outdoor gathering space at Moir Park, and improved accessibility.

Benefits: Any investment to enhance trail access needs to be balanced with the commitment to preserve the corridor and protect the safety and enjoyment of all users. If funding is approved by voters in November, residents would be engaged to help determine the exact improvements for the corridor.

Cost: \$20 million.

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

loomington residents consider the city's safety and economy to be key assets according to the 2023 National Community SurveyTM.

Approximately 9 in 10 respondents said they felt very or somewhat safe in their neighborhoods and in Bloomington's commercial areas during the day, and from flood, fire or other natural disasters. Similarly, 8 in 10 respondents reported feeling safe from violent crime and property crime.

Bloomington's economy results were on par with or higher than benchmark comparisons to other communities nationwide. Ratings for Bloomington as a place to work, employment options and shopping opportunities eclipsed those in comparison communities nationally.

Respondents poured out praise for Bloomington's drinking water. This year's approval rating of 92% ranked Bloomington number one among hundreds of benchmark cities nationwide.

Other findings

- 88% of respondents rated Bloomington as a place to live as excellent or good, similar to last year's score.
- Snow removal continued to get high marks with a satisfaction rating of 92%, ranking again in the top 15% of all jurisdictions polled nationwide.
- Street repair, ease of walking in the city and opportunities to participate in community matters were cited as areas for improvement.

This was the 12th consecutive year that the National Community Survey™ was conducted in Bloomington. The poll was performed by Polco/National Research Center.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GROW: HOME-GROWING CANNABIS SAFELY

innesota became the 23rd state to legalize recreational cannabis this year. The new law allows people to grow up to eight cannabis plants at home, with no more than four being mature at a time. If you plan to home grow, make sure you know the safety risks and City electrical code before getting started.

What's allowed if a person wants to grow cannabis at home?

- Flowering plants may be grown at a single residence if it is at the primary residence of someone 21 or older.
- Plants must be in an enclosed, locked space not open for public view, whether plants are grown indoors or outdoors.

MAKE SURE YOUR SETUP FOLLOWS CITY CODE

- Electrical permits are required for any installation, addition, extension, alteration, demolition or replacement of an electrical system or electrical system element, according to National Electrical Code and Minnesota State building code.
 - To apply for an electrical permit in the Bloomington, visit the City's online permit portal at blm.mn/portal.

KEEP YOURSELF SAFE

- Ensure the area you are using to grow has good ventilation. If it doesn't, mold could grow and affect air quality.
- Ensure electrical cords are in good condition, not broken or cut. If they are compromised, electrical cords can start a fire.
- Have a fire escape plan.
- Do not use flexible extension cords or cables as fixed wiring.
- Do not run extension cords through holes in walls, ceilings or floors.
- Do not run flexible extension cords through doorways or windows or under carpets, or attach them to building surfaces.

Powered by CO.STARTERS, a nationally recognized small business support program, CEO Start offers anyone in Hennepin County with a great business idea a framework for testing and validating their idea so they can build a viable business.

Participants will join 10 – 15 entrepreneurs to work through the CO.STARTERS program. Over the course of 10 weeks, participants will closely examine their ideas with peers, through industry research, facilitated discussions and interviews with potential customers.

At the end of the program, participants will have a deeper understanding of how to create a sustainable venture, articulate their models and repeat the process with their next great idea.

The program will be held in Bloomington from January 30 through April 2, 2024. Applications will be accepted until December 1, 2023. HAVE YOU HERD? GOATS HELP REMOVE INVASIVE PLANTS

Park Maintenance hired Goat Dispatch last summer to bring in goats for buckthorn control in Harrison Park.

Grazing goats have been shown to ease woodland takeover by invasive and exotic species such as buckthorn and garlic mustard, in an eco-friendly manner. Bloomington staff cleared a three- to five-foot-wide trail for installation of temporary fencing to hold the goats as they grazed invasive buckthorn and garlic mustard.

Residents can also help keep these invasive species in check by participating in buckthorn bust and garlic mustard pull volunteer events held throughout the summer and autumn seasons.

FIRE STATION 4 OPENS WITH A LOOK AHEAD

he Bloomington Fire Department went through big changes in the last year. It has hired and trained 24 new firefighters as it shifts its staffing model. It also opened the new Station 4, Bloomington's newest fire station.

"It is exciting to see the BFD grow in recent years with new, up-to-date stations and a new staffing model," said Fire Chief Ulie Seal, who has been with the BFD since 1976. "These changes increase our ability to provide an increasingly higher level

To accommodate full-time firefighters, the new Station 4 is double the size of the station it replaced. The extra space accommodates living quarters, decontamination facilities, health and wellness facilities and other critical functions.

Station 3 was updated in 2020. The remaining four Bloomington fire stations will be replaced as part of the City's capital improvement plan. Fire Station 2 is next. Hiring and training new firefighters will continue until staffing levels are met.

"The goal of a home safety inspection is to help educate people about keeping everyone safe, not to enforce code," said City Fire Inspector Pete Miller.

Once you arrange for an inspection, in less than an hour a fire inspector will walk through your house with you or another adult, and:

- Check that all smoke alarms are functioning appropriately.
- Look for any potential hazards and provide recommendations.
- Help you develop your family's escape plan.
- Provide cooking safety and general fire safety tips.

SHOP SAFE THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

n a city with so many shopping options, there are plenty of places to buy presents for your loved ones. When you are out and about gathering gifts, follow these safety tips:

- Stay alert to your surroundings. If you see people loitering in parking garages, parking lots or outside of stores, go the other way.
- Park near streetlights or ramp lighting if possible and have your keys in hand when you return to the car. Check the interior of your car before getting inside.
- Coordinate shopping trips with a friend if you plan to be out late.
- Don't park in unlit lots, no matter how convenient.
- Lock your car and close the windows, even if you're gone only a few minutes.
 - Lock packages in the trunk.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible. Be sure to put the receipt in your purse or wallet.
 Never leave it in the bag.
- Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse under your arm. Keep a wallet in an inside jacket pocket, not a pants pocket.
- Teach your children to go to a store clerk or security guard and ask for help if they become separated in a store or shopping mall.


