

## Unallowable Use of Ship Funds Expense List

Please note that this is not an exhaustive list. The list is current as of 1/23/24 and is subject to change without notice.

- 1. Alcohol/cannabis or any illegal substance
- 2. Animals/any expenses related to animals
- 3. Any cost not directly related to the SHIP priorities and strategic directions
- 4. Bad debts
- 5. Building or improving a fitness center
- 6. Building or paving a walking or bike path
- 7. Cash assistance paid directly to individuals to meet their personal or family needs
- 8. Cement (except when used for securing approved SHIP amenities)
- 9. Clothing and footwear
- 10. Consumable/Disposable items not linked to approved SHIP PSE change start-up expenses.

  Consumable/Disposable items may be allowable one time only as start-up costs that are part of an approved SHIP PSE change. Ongoing expenses for consumables/disposable items are unallowable.
- 11. Contributions or donations
- 12. Costs incurred prior to the grant award
- 13. COVID response expenses
- 14. Designated smoking area signs
- 15. Direct patient medical services or care including nicotine replacement therapy; other non-FDA approved devices such as vape pens or essential oil vaporizers
- 16. Direct treatment of disease or disability
- 17. Entrance feeds to parks or recreational facilities
- 18. Entertainment/Performers
- 19. Equipment repair or maintenance costs
- 20. Fines and penalties
- 21. Food and Beverage
- 22. Gifts for staff
- 23. Goods or services for personal use
- 24. Interest on bills, loans, etc.
- 25. Land rental for gardens
- 26. Liability insurance for community partners/sites
- 27. Lobbying at the federal, state, or local level
- 28. Losses on agreements or contracts

- 29. Memberships to clubs, camps, fitness centers and similar groups
- 30. Mischarging of costs
- 31. Ongoing subsidies of healthier food alternatives in vending machines, school lunches or workplaces
- 32. Ongoing subsidies of rental fees for equipment use at a recreational center or park
- 33. Political campaigns on behalf of, or in opposition to, any candidate for public office
- 34. Raffles (raising money by selling tickets)
- 35. Rental or purchase of a facility for ongoing activity programming such as smoking cessation or weight loss groups
- 36. Replacement of functioning equipment
- 37. Research (The distinction between research and program evaluation is complex and dependent on the purpose of the study. However, the difference can be summarized in this way: "Research is done for the purposes of generating knowledge, whereas program evaluation is done for the purpose of understanding the extent to which the intervention was effective" (Issel, 2009).
- 38. Scholarships (includes camp fees and scholarships for individuals to participate in events, classes or programs not linked to PSE change)
- 39. Sidewalks or curb cuts
- 40. Staff time beyond 5 percent of individual time to lead trainings (SHIP staff are encouraged to conduct train the trainer courses with partners/sites to ensure sustainability of training programs in their communities)
- 41. Start-up of a non-profit organization or private business
- 42. Start-up or Subsidizing the ongoing cost of a weight loss program or group
- 43. Subsidizing the purchase of smoking cessation medications, including nicotine replacement therapy (NRT), or non-evidence-based cessation programs (e.g., hypnosis)
- 44. Supplanting of funds from other sources
- 45. Travel outside of the USA
- 46. Vaping/ e-cigarette detectors
- 47. Vending Machines

## Community Setting MN Moves Specific Unallowable:

- 1. Exercise machines
- 2. Bicycles that are NOT planned to have an educational or transportation-related use
- 3. Fitness equipment used for individual behavior change
- 4. Games (examples (not an exhaustive list): bocce ball, cornhole, ladder ball, gaga pit, etc.)
- 5. Ongoing event expenses
- 6. Permanent driver feedback signs (portable are allowed)
- 7. Playground equipment
- 8. Community Recreational Sports Leagues which do not focus on the following prioritized populations: rural areas, people of color, older adults, persons with disabilities, women, recent immigrants, members of LGBTQ+ communities, those with lower educational attainment, and those in lower income groups.
- 9. Trail lighting
- 10. Trees, grass and plants
- 11. Trishaws
- 12. Welcome signs
- 13. Landscaping labor and installation (landscape planning is allowable)
- 14. Recreation sport facility construction

## Workplace (All Context Areas) Specific Unallowable:

- 1. Air Fryer
- 2. Aroma therapy
- 3. Behavior-change presentations and classes to employees
- 4. Books or DVDs
- 5. Building uses: floors, beams, columns, roofing, piles, bricks, mortar, panels, plaster
- 6. Constructing a permanent sports field, pool, court, or similar recreational facility
- 7. Costs associated with hosting a health fair
- 8. Costs for providing employee health screenings
- 9. Designated smoking areas, shelters, and ashtrays
- 10. Ergonomic chairs
- 11. Fitness club memberships including on-line memberships
- 12. Home exercise equipment
- 13. Icemaker
- 14. Magazine subscriptions
- 15. Massage therapy
- 16. Pedometers
- 17. Professional Licensure renewal costs for LPH SHIP staff or contracted staff
- 18. Scales or BMI measuring devices
- 19. Shower facilities
- 20. Stability balls to use in lieu of desk chairs
- 21. Subsidizing the ongoing cost of a weight loss program or group
- 22. Teaching/facilitating fitness and yoga classes
- 23. Team building activities
- 24. Tools like stress balls, massage chairs, handheld massage tools like bump balls
- 25. Video gaming equipment

## Community Setting MN Wellbeing Specific Unallowable

- 1. Behavior-change classes
- 2. Mental health treatment or training mental health staff in mental health modalities or therapy
- 3. Trees
- 4. Games
