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

panning 240 acres, the Nine Mile Creek corridor is a beautiful slice of nature, featuring trails and many outdoor amenities that residents enjoy. Celebrate the history and share your stories of the Nine Mile Creek Corridor area on May 21, 4-6 p.m., at Moir Park shelter, 10320 Morgan Ave S. At this Moving Bloomington Forward launch event, you will meet the project team, and learn about the project and estimated timeline. Bring your family and enjoy the park, yard games and treats. Food truck vendor, Sambus Samosa will also be there. This is the first engagement opportunity for the Moving Bloomington Forward project focused on renewing the Nine Mile Creek Corridor and improving Moir/Central Parks.

#### SOUTH LOOP WATER PARK **CONVERSATIONS CONTINUE**

n March and April, the City Council and Port Authority Commission talked through updated plans for Mystery Cove Waterpark at Mall of America. The new plans include a 220,000-square-foot building with a 144,000-square-foot "pool hall" space, which is smaller than previously proposed.

There will be no direct taxpayer cost for the \$373 million project. A portion of Mall of America's property taxes will go into the water park, via tax increment financing (TIF), to make it financially viable. The plans for the water park also include discounted admission for Bloomington residents.

The City Council and Port Authority also



discussed options to finance the \$373 million project that would include a skyway connecting the park to Mall of America and a new parking lot. Current plans for the water park include a splash pad, wave pool, 30 rides and slides, a lazy river and a retractable roof. The smaller footprint of the building and advanced mechanical systems used for the roof are projected to reduce energy consumption compared to previous plans, according to Mall of America.

"MOA's continued strong performance is essential to defraying the property tax that residents would otherwise need to pay, and supports the success of many other hospitality businesses in Bloomington," Port Authority Administrator Holly Masek said.

#### HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE STATE OF THE CITY

t was my pleasure to present this year's State of the City address to the more than 230 attendees at the Zawadi Center.

City Manager Jamie Verbrugge and I covered a range of topics, including the voter-approved sales tax, how we're working to provide housing that people can afford and the importance of Bloomington's business community. Here are some key takeaways from the event:



#### **BLOOMINGTON IS INVESTING \$159 MILLION IN THE COMMUNITY**

Enhancing quality of life and protecting natural resources with three projects funded by a voter-approved sales tax: Bloomington Ice Garden renovations, Nine Mile Creek corridor preservation and improvements, and building a new community health and wellness center.

#### **BLOOMINGTON SUPPORTS BUSINESSES OF ALL SIZES**

The City has notable programs and projects that support businesses and economic growth, including:

- Welcoming Wednesdays every month to provide startup and small business resources.
- Bloomington Business Connections, a partnership with the Minneapolis Regional Chamber.
- A new site and façade improvement program that offers grants to cover up to 50% of total project costs. See page 3.
- A five-year economic development action plan that just kicked off this month.

#### "EGG"CITING NEWS FOR ENTREPRENEURS

The City is partnering with the Minneapolis Regional Chamber to host Hatch Bloomington, an entrepreneurial pitch competition, with a \$100,000 award and community voting—think "Shark Tank" meets "American Idol."

The contest aims to draw more small businesses to Bloomington. The Hatch winner will have a storefront presence in the city. You can learn more at hatchbloomington.com.



#### BLOOMINGTON IS FOCUSED ON CREATING AND PRESERVING HOUSING PEOPLE CAN AFFORD

The City Council made major changes to residential zoning provisions to stimulate more housing production, promote home ownership and lower housing costs by allowing smaller lots, homes and garages. The Bloomington Housing and Redevelopment Authority was also awarded a nearly \$3.2 million grant last December to build 27 new single-family homes for households earning at or below 80% of the area median income. Housing is a primary wealth-building tool. Inequitable access to this opportunity prevents the City from living out the values outlined in its *Bloomington. Tomorrow. Together.* strategic plan. #### WORK CONTINUES ON I-494 AND I-35W INTERCHANGE

The Minnesota Department of
Transportation is constructing E-ZPass
lanes on I-494 from Hwy 100 to I-35W in
each direction and adding a new ramp at the
I-35W and I-494 interchange. Work on this
project began last spring and will continue
through fall 2026. When work is completed,
the E-ZPass lanes and the new ramp at the
I-35W and I-494 interchange will address
congestion on the interstate.

Crews are also replacing the bridges crossing over I-494 at Portland Avenue, Nicollet Avenue, and 12th Avenue, and adding a new pedestrian bridge at Chicago Avenue that crosses over I-494 to provide an

When the project is complete, vehicles will no longer be able to access I-494 from Nicollet Avenue and 12th Avenue, but there will be full access to I-494 from Portland Avenue.

This is the first of four construction projects that are part of the I-494: Airport to Hwy 169 vision.

#### PUT A NEW FACE ON YOUR BUSINESS WITH HELP FROM A CITY GRANT

The grant-funded Site and Façade Improvement Program covers half of the cost when businesses make revitalizing improvements to public facing commercial areas in Bloomington.

Eligible businesses receive 50 percent of the cost of their project, a minimum of \$5,000 and a maximum of \$24,999 per property. Total project cost with the grant would range from \$10,000-\$50,000 or more.

Eligible improvements include repairing or replacing windows, doors, canopies, parapets and steps; removing exterior finishes or materials that cover architectural details; sidewalk and pedestrian improvements; mounted signage; murals, landscaping and masonry repairs; ADA accessibility to building from outside; and more.

## FIBER OPTICS IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD

f you see non-City crews working in a right of way along a street near you, or in backyard drainage and utility easements, they may be installing fiber optic cable to provide options for faster internet speed for residents. The installation is expected to continue through 2024.

This work is not being carried out by the City of Bloomington.

The companies installing fiber in Bloomington have permits to perform the work.

#### BE A WATER HERO: ADOPT A LOCAL DRAIN OR TWO

o you ever think about those drains along your street? The water, and everything else, that enters those grated drains flows through pipes directly into our lakes, ponds, rivers, streams and wetlands. If too much debris enters, the drain can clog and cause flooding.

By volunteering just 15 minutes once or twice a month to sweep up, rake up or pick up whatever is in the drain(s) you adopt, you become a hero in the effort to keep our drains flowing and our water clean.

Ready to be your street's water hero? Visit Minnesota's Adopt-A-Drain program at mn.adopt-a-drain. org. Find your street and select the drains you want to adopt. Don't forget to review tips on safety and drain clearing and report the estimated pounds of drain debris you collect.

In Bloomington last year, more than 454 Adopt-A-Drain volunteers adopted 776 drains and stopped more than 4,500 lbs. of debris from entering water bodies in Bloomington. Thank you for your service! Keep reporting your impressive numbers!


## SOLID WASTE STUDY LOOKS AT NEW RATE STRUCTURE

The City is conducting a solid waste rate study to better understand the relationship between solid waste service costs, how much residents throw away and garbage cart sizes. One study goal is to consider expanding the City's Pay-As-You-Throw (PAYT) garbage rate structure.

With PAYT, residents pay for trash collected based on the size of their trash containers. The current PAYT rate structure has a small cost difference for different garbage cart sizes. PAYT rates with more notable cost differences between garbage carts sizes could better reflect how residents' use our solid waste programs and encourage increased recycling, composting and waste reduction.

Study results will be presented to the City Council this summer and may be considered as part of the City's 2025 solid waste rate setting process.

## EARTH ACTION HEROES: THREE BUCKTHORN BUSTERS

uckthorn is one of Minnesota's most damaging invasive plants. Its leaves sprout in early spring and remain through autumn. Buckthorn lacks nutrition so it is a poor food source for birds and mammals. It also creates dense shade that outcompetes many native plants and shrubs that are nutrient rich.

Though cities, counties and the state have programs to combat the beast that is buckthorn, it is efforts by local Earth Action Heroes, such as Anders Westanmo, Pat Nelson and Mike Borowiak that could make the difference in this fight.

"Much of Bloomington's forests are infested with buckthorn," said Nelson, a full-time father and part-time teacher.

"Working with the City of Bloomington and Three Rivers District, we adopted a 19-acre lot in Hyland Park," said Westanmo, a pharmacist. "These coordinated buckthorn busts help us cover more ground."

Buckthorn control treatments can occur at any point in the year, but these volunteers are very active in fall and winter when chemical control can be most effective.

"It's a small action to take to help our city," said Borowiak, a clinical social worker. "It will take the efforts of many to manage this environmental problem."

- 1. First, food scraps and other compostable materials are collected from participating residents through the City's organics recycling program.
- 2. Then, the City processes organics into compost.
- 3. Finally, nutrient-rich compost is returned to participating residents.








### POLICE REMEMBERED AND RECOGNIZED

his year, Sunday, May 12-Saturday, May 18, is National Police Week and May 15 is National Peace Officers Memorial Day.

Suggested by President Kennedy in 1962, congress passed a resolution that same year designating May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week it falls in as Police Week.

The service and sacrifice of all officers across the country killed in the line of duty are honored annually during the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund's annual candlelight vigil in Washington D.C. This year's vigil is Monday, May 13 at 8 p.m. where 282 officers killed in the line of duty in 2023 will be honored.

Multiple nominations came in for Martinsen referencing her exceptional dedication and hard work while demonstrating respect in all her interactions. She masters multiple tasks at one time, has amazing attention to detail, maintains a depth of knowledge, and has a passion for serving.

Martinsen goes above and beyond to serve the community and her colleagues. She is respected by the Police and Fire staff as they recognize the important role she has in keeping them safe as they serve the community, referring to her as a guardian angel.

#### BLOOMINGTON YESTERDAY: FIRE TRUCKS

Rescue is one of the most important roles in a fire department. To save people from fires, fire departments use trucks like a "fire engine" and lots of equipment. Over the past several decades, fire engines have advanced. The truck in the center of this photo is one of Bloomington Fire Department's first acquired trucks. It was a 1946 Ford truck that was retrofitted with a 250 gallons per minute pump and a 500 gallon water tank.



The city's current

fire trucks can pump 2,000 gallons of water per minute

and carry a 750-gallon water tank. One thing that has not changed over the years is Bloomington firefighters' dedication to serving their community.


