CELEBRATING PROJECT MILESTONES

loomington is making investments in its parks and facilities that will serve the community for years to come. Hundreds of people gathered at ribbon cuttings and a ground breaking in October to celebrate milestones in the following projects.

Bryant and Tretbaugh parks

■he new Bryant Park, 1001 W. 85th St., was celebrated with a ribbon-cutting event last month. The new park features Bloomington's first fully inclusive playground, a new park shelter, a skate park, baseball field, hockey rink, cricket pitch, and new tennis and basketball courts.

Tretbaugh Park, 3701 W. 90th St., is the City's first-ever bike skills park. The reimagined park features a paved all-wheel track and a gravel mountain bike course for riders of all ages and skill levels.

The Tretbaugh and Bryant park transformations are major milestones guided by the Park System Master Plan's focus on mobility, equity and new park amenities.

COMMUNITY HEALTH AND WELLNESS CENTER

➡he City broke ground on the new community health and wellness center in October. The new center will be a modern, inclusive facility providing recreation, fitness and health activities, and community programs for residents of all ages and backgrounds throughout the region. Demolition of Creekside began at the end of October. Construction of the new facility is scheduled to continue through 2026 with a goal of opening the new facility in 2027. BLOOMINGTON WELCOMES NEW CITY MANAGER

ach Walker, at right, began serving as Bloomington's newest city manager on October 20.

Walker has nearly two decades of executive level local government experience, most recently serving as city manager of Independence, the fifth largest city in Missouri.

Independence shares a lot in common with Bloomington. Zach brings an impressive resume and a lot of accomplishments to the table. I'm excited for the community to get to know him.

In Independence, Walker oversaw a full-service city of more than 1,200 employees and a \$454 million budget. He led major initiatives focused on strategic planning, fiscal discipline, organizational modernization and inclusive community development.

Walker championed transformational projects including a \$1 billion industrial development, a \$36 million commercial redevelopment, and the first Comprehensive Development Plan update in 25 years. He led the creation of the City's first Convention and Visitor's Bureau and implemented its inaugural Tourism Master Plan. Other major accomplishments include completing more than \$70 million in capital improvements, launching a citywide housing study and expanding mental health and homelessness outreach services through innovative partnerships.

"I'm honored to join the City of Bloomington as its next city manager. This is a vibrant, forward-thinking community with a strong sense of civic pride and shared purpose," Walker said. "I look forward to working alongside the City Council, dedicated City staff, and engaged residents to build on Bloomington's many strengths, foster inclusive growth, **BLOOMINGTONMN.GOV**



and deliver high-quality services that support a thriving, welcoming city for all. I'm excited to get started and to become part of a community that clearly cares deeply about its future."

Walker began his career in the Missouri House of Representatives and the Mid-Missouri Regional Planning Commission before completing the Cookingham-Noll Fellowship with the City of Kansas City, Missouri. He joined Independence in 2012, rising from internal auditor to assistant city manager before becoming city manager in 2016. He holds a master of public affairs from the University of Missouri, is an ICMA-Credentialed Manager, and served as president of the Missouri City/County Management Association.

CITY SCORES WELL IN NATIONAL COMMUNITY SURVEYTM

loomington residents consider the overall quality of the city's natural environment, preservation of natural areas, quality of open space, recycling services and yard waste pick-up services to be key assets according to the 2025 National Community Survey. Resident sentiments are also on the rise for police, crime prevention and animal control with an increase of about 10 points from the 2024 survey.

Ratings for the availability of preventive health services and availability of affordable quality mental health care saw declines in 2024 that have rebounded sharply in 2025, both ultimately ranking higher than the national average.

Engagement and inclusivity continue to be strengths, with rising ratings for residents' sense of community, opportunities to volunteer, the community making all residents feel welcome and taking care of vulnerable residents, and openness and acceptance of the community toward people of diverse backgrounds.

Bloomington's economic results were on par with or higher than benchmark comparisons to other communities nationwide. Ratings for Bloomington as a place to work, employment options and shopping opportunities eclipsed those in comparison communities nationally.

Other findings

- When asked to rate sources of information regarding the City, residents identified the *Bloomington Briefing* as a top source, followed by the City's website.
 - Snow removal continued to get high marks with a satisfaction rating of 85%, ranking higher than benchmark cities.
 - 92% of respondents ranked the City's drinking water as excellent or good, which is much higher than benchmark cities.

Recent changes to federal policy are ending several popular home energy tax credits earlier than expected, most by December 31, 2025.

Whether you're upgrading insulation, switching to electric appliances or installing a heat pump, these incentives can help make your home safer, healthier and more affordable.

So, act now and do the work before the new deadlines. Utility rebates will remain a funding source beyond 2025, as well as soon-tolaunch federal and state energy rebates for low and moderate-income households.

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On the right track: Improving traffic for a better city

treets connect us to our community. The City's
Neighborhood Traffic Management Program is designed
to make local streets safer and more accessible.

The NTMP's core purpose is to create a safe and livable city where everyone can get where they need to go, whether by car, foot, bike or public transit. This is achieved by managing traffic speeds, improving safety and increasing accessibility.

"Traffic calming is not just about engineering roads; it's about empowering neighborhoods," said Traffic Management Coordinator Paul Jarvis. "Small-scale projects can have a big impact, transforming neighborhoods and making streets safer and more welcoming. The biggest changes often come from the

smallest adjustments, asked for by the people who know their streets best."

The program was shaped by community input, and its main goals reflect a commitment to public safety and quality of life:

- Improve safety for everyone on our roadways.
- Enhance mobility and accessibility for people of all ages and abilities.
 - Advance equity to ensure benefits are shared citywide.
- Develop a cost-effective and easy-to-understand program.

BIG SAVINGS FOR SMALL CARTS

GARBAGE RATE CHANGES COULD BE COMING IN 2026

loomington's garbage rates may change in 2026. The pay-as-you-throw system will remain, but price gaps will widen so smaller carts cost less. A new, lower-priced every-other-week pickup will also be available for households with the smallest cart and minimal trash.

These updates, based on a rate study and resident feedback, aim to keep service affordable and reduce waste. What you can do:

- Downsize carts if they're rarely full.
- Choose every-other-week service if weekly pickup isn't needed.
- Recycle and compost more to shrink trash.
- Sign up for organics recycling at no extra cost to keep food scraps and other compostable materials out of the garbage.

Preliminary rates were presented to the City Council on July 28. Final adoption is expected after the November 17 public hearing. Watch for more details this fall to select your cart size and service level if the proposed changes are adopted. Learn more at blm.mn/garbage or call 952-563-8726.

Once the City releases the Winter Lights Tour locations and route on December 2, tour the lights of Bloomington and pick your favorites.



BLOOMINGTON POLICE CRUISE TO A BIG WIN IN NATIONAL TRAFFIC SAFETY CONTEST

loomington Police Department cruised into first place in All Traffic Solutions' annual sign contest in September. Agencies from across the country submitted videos showing how they use radar message signs to slow drivers, share alerts and collect traffic data. Winners were chosen by public vote and, thanks to strong community support, Bloomington came out on top.

BPD's video featured Police Officer Chris Wegner sitting

in a lawn chair by a squad car with coffee in hand, keeping an eye on drivers' speeds as they go by. The humor clearly hit the mark, helping Bloomington secure a new SpeedAlert 18 radar message sign and a yearlong TraffiCloud® subscription to boost local traffic safety.

CITY RECEIVES STATE AND NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR COMMUNICATIONS AND ENGAGEMENT

Bloomington received nine awards from the Minnesota Association of Government Communicators 2025 Northern Lights Awards. Three of the awards were first-place honors.

In the statewide contest, the City won Northern Lights Awards (first place) for *Embracing trends in City social media*, *Bloomington Today* and the *Notable Neighbor* video series; and Silver Awards (second place) for the *Moving Bloomington Forward Annual Report*, the *Bloomington Briefing* newsletter,

MEET FIREFIGHTER AARON SOUR: SERVING BLOOMINGTON ON THE GROUND AND FROM THE SKY



For Air Force veteran and longtime Bloomington resident Duane Brinkman, service has always meant dedication to country, family and community.


Raised on a farm in Austin,
Minnesota, Brinkman enlisted in the
Air Force in 1967, drawn to the "big
planes." He served in San Antonio,
Denver, and Vietnam before returning
home in 1969. Soon after, he met his
wife Glenda, and they built their life
in Bloomington, raising two children,
Kimberly and Travis.

Decades later, service called again. In 2016, Bloomington became a Commemorative Partner of the United States' 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War, pledging to honor veterans and their families. One message from local Vietnam veterans stood out: they wanted a memorial to recognize all who served, including POWs and families who sacrifice alongside them.


Inspired, Duane stepped forward as treasurer of the nonprofit Bloomington Remembers Veterans, helping raise funds for what will become the Veterans Memorial at Harrison Park. That vision will be realized on Veterans Day 2026, exactly a decade after Bloomington's pledge.
























HONORING ALL WHO SERVE, PAST AND PRESENT
