MNDOT APPROVES I-494, I-35W IMPROVEMENTS

REMOVING TRANSPORTATION BARRIERS, IT'S GOOD BUSINESS

or more than a decade, the City has advocated for I an update to the I-35W and I-494 interchange to reduce traffic delays and improve safety. It's the busiest and most congested in the state, carrying nearly 500,000 vehicles daily.


In April, MnDOT awarded \$204 million toward I-35W and I-494 improvements across Bloomington, Edina and Richfield through its Corridors for Commerce program. The grant funds will be allocated as detailed below:

- Complete phase 1 of the I-494/I-35W turbine interchange, northbound to westbound directional ramp—\$70 million.
- Add MnPASS lanes in both directions on I-494 from France Avenue to Trunk Highway 77 eastbound and from Trunk Highway 77 to I-35W westbound—\$134 million.

This funding marks a key step in improving transportation infrastructure in the south metro.

"These projects will ease frustration for hundreds of thousands of commuters and improve commerce for the region by updating an interchange that has been in dire need of improvement for many years," Bloomington Mayor Gene Winstead said. "Thank you to the governor, MnDOT and legislators who helped make funding for Corridors of Commerce possible."

A number of governmental agencies and civic organizations worked diligently for years to help provide awareness and funding for these projects, including: state legislators along the I-494 and I-35W corridor, numerous chambers of commerce, the I-494 Corridor Commission, the 35W Solutions Alliance, neighboring cities and Hennepin County. Construction could start as early as fall 2021.



SUMMER CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

- The connection from Old Cedar Avenue bridge to Old Shakopee Road, the river trail connections, the trailhead and connect to the Nokomis - Minnesota River Regional trail will be completed by the end of this construction season.
- The medians on Normandale Boulevard and the bike path on the west side will be completed by early July.
- MnDOT will work to complete the westbound on-ramp at East Bush Lake road and I-494 in cooperation with the City. This will take the entire construction season and should be complete in early 2019.



GET CREATIVE: ATTEND A PAINTING PARTY

ake your mark on the mural coming to Wright's Lake Park, at 8501 17th Avenue South. GoodSpace Murals, Artistry and the City are hosting community painting parties on June 12, 23, 25 and 30. From brainstorming design concepts to putting paint on canvas,

The mural is one of the City's neighborhood emphasis projects in the area and creative placemaking efforts in partnership with Artistry. Organizers hope the mural will discourage graffiti and highlight the new regional bike trail


FORWARD 2040 WHAT DO YOU THINK?



PARTNERING TO ADVANCE ENERGY EFFICIENCY

n May, the City Council approved an energy action plan for Bloomington that sets community-wide goals to reduce greenhouse emissions from energy use. The plan was developed by a team of community representatives through Xcel Energy's Partners in Energy program.

The plan calls for a 75 percent reduction in combined emissions from electricity and natural gas by the year

2035. To achieve this goal, the plan outlines near-term and long-term strategies to increase energy-efficient practices and renewable energy generation in commercial, residential and municipal sectors. The plan also includes strategies to reduce emissions from transportation.

The Partners in Energy team was approved by Council in 2017 and held five workshops to develop the

plan. The team includes members of the Bloomington Sustainability Commission; City staff; Bloomington residents; Bloomington Public Schools; staff from local businesses Donaldson, HealthPartners, Mall of America, OATI, Quality Bike Products; and other organizations.

The City will issue a notice if your grass is taller than that. If there is no change in seven days, the City will arrange for a contractor to mow your lawn and the fee will be assessed to your property taxes. Questions on the code?
