MAYOR'S MEMO A well-maintained and affordable city

B loomington's housing market is strong. When people move here, they stay here—on average 16.5 years. Houses are on the market an average of only 28 days before being sold. While there is currently a variety of housing available, the City is working to provide more affordable housing to meet the Met Council's 2030 affordable housing target—one part of recent focused renewal efforts.

The focused renewal priority is part of the City Council's One Bloomington plan. The Housing and Redevelopment Authority has been working with several different organizations to help low- to moderate-income home buyers find their place in Bloomington.

Habitat for Humanity started construction on a new house on Wentworth Avenue South earlier this summer. The HRA helps Habitat for Humanity locate vacant City-owned lots. Habitat for Humanity then builds a home for a family in need at a price that's affordable for them.

When the house is finished, Habitat for Humanity sells the house at no profit—charging only for the materials used. This isn't the first time Habitat for Humanity has built a home in Bloomington. To see the story of a family who recently bought one of these homes, visit blm.mn/hfh.

The HRA is also working with the West Hennepin Affordable Housing Land Trust to purchase and rehab homes in Bloomington. After the rehab work is done, the home is sold to a low-or moderate-income, first-time home buyer.

Keeping homes, streets and businesses looking good and functioning well is also a priority. Last year, the Bloomington City Council and HRA authorized \$1.8 million to help revitalize neighborhoods and housing through several new and expanded loan programs. They include the Curb Appeal Loan Program for exterior home improvements, and sidewalk and park improvements that initially focused on the neighborhood inside the boundaries of American Boulevard, Old Cedar Avenue, 90th Street and Portland Avenue. Since the Curb Appeal Loan program started in 2016, 35 loans have been committed. To find out more about this program, visit blm.mn/fix.

The City Council and HRA also expanded the City's popular loans for home improvements to help keep neighborhoods looking good. Approved repairs include roofing, siding, windows and electrical, heating or plumbing upgrades. This program has been successful. In 2016 alone the HRA loaned \$2.4 million to 90 eligible homeowners with 82 additional applications out for bid.

As another part of ongoing renewal efforts, the City is engaging business owners in targeted commercial areas in discussions about potential rehab projects.

A CAREER THAT SHAPED BLOOMINGTON

When Community Development Director Larry Lee started at the City as an associate planner in 1978, the comprehensive plan was a typed document with hand-drawn illustrations, Mall of America didn't exist, the Twins and Vikings played at Met Stadium and the North Stars at Met Center, and South Loop was about 40 percent farm fields.

Throughout his almost 40-year career at the City, Lee was a member of teams that changed the landscape of Bloomington. He will retire on August 31.

Bloomington's best-known landmark is Mall of America and Lee was involved from the beginning. He was instrumental in introducing developers Triple Five to Bloomington and has been involved in all the site's development phases. With future phases still being planned, he jokes that it will be hard for him to leave "an unfinished project."

South Loop, home to MOA, represents another focus of Lee's career. He helped the City rebrand the district (formerly called Airport South) as a distinctive urban center where people live, work and play. He also championed the City's

creative placemaking partnership with Artistry—using public art and events to create a unique sense of place. He lobbied for South Loop's infrastructure strengths—retaining Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport at its current location and connecting light-rail transit to Mall of America. Retaining MSP Airport at its current location was Bloomington's primary legislative priority in the early '90s. When the Legislature and Governor decided to keep MSP Airport here in 1996, Lee coordinated Bloomington's responses to rezone and acquire property in the city to mitigate aircraft noise for residents while maintaining the benefits of being next to an international airport. "With innovative ideas and the ability to carry them out, Larry has been a catalyst for creative projects and solutions in Bloomington," City Manager Jamie Verbrugge said. He worked on many of the City's comprehensive plans and State Legislative initiatives, participated in creating the three development districts (Normandale Lake, Penn-American and South Loop) and smaller neighborhood redevelopments, and interpreted Bloomington's future in the metropolitan area to City Councils, residents, developers and the media. Before becoming community development director, he served as assistant city manager for six years.

exterior visibility for transit riders, improve station amenities and aesthetic appeal, and provide convenient pedestrian access. With the funds from the bonding bill, the project is fully funded at \$25 million, will start construction in the spring of 2018 and be completed a year later.

The METRO Orange Line, a 17-mile planned highway bus rapid transit line that will connect Bloomington with Minneapolis, Richfield and Burnsville along I-35W, also received \$12.1 million as part of the bill. If federal funding is secured, construction of the Orange Line could start as early as mid-2018.

Hilton

New hotels coming to South Loop

South Loop will soon have more lodging options for visitors. Hilton chose Bloomington as the first Minnesota location for its new budget-friendly hotel brand, Tru. The Bloomington Planning Commission approved the plan for the four-story, 182-room hotel in May. The building will house two Hilton hotels under the same roof—half will be Tru and the other half will be a Home2 Suites. A Cambria Suites hotel is also expected to break ground this year. more people per household in existing units and more people in group quarters. DRAWING ATTENTION TO NATIVE PLANTINGS

arkkeeper II Matt Elasky, *above*, had an opportunity to get creative and try something new at work this spring:

fabricating large-scale, artistic metal sculptures. The two butterfly sculptures recently installed at the Public Works building, 1700 West 98th Street, are the first of a series of sculptures to come that will serve as markers for native planting areas in Bloomington.

"The idea is to draw more attention to some of the native plantings we have," said Assistant Maintenance Superintendent Dave Hanson.

Native plantings reduce the amount of mowing by Public Works crews. They also serve as vital habitats for birds, pollinators and other wildlife. More sculptures will be added to native planting areas throughout the city in the coming years.

DID YOU KNOW?

The City has 50 native planting areas ranging from undisturbed prairie fields to small rain gardens. The newest is at the off-leash area on Nesbitt Avenue. Thanks to a visitor who contacted the City after noticing milkweed growing at the site, crews have made extra efforts to let the milkweed grow for pollinators.

This summer, sculptures will be installed at the off-leash area on Nesbitt Avenue. The 25-acre, off-leash recreation area on 111th Street between Nesbitt and Hampshire avenues has a threequarter mile walking path, grassy hills, a pond and a water fountain area for dogs and their owners.

ave you ever bought a basket full of fresh produce and before you know it, it's all gone bad? Here are some tips to help you fight food waste:

- Practice meal planning.
- Make meals in batches.
- Make an "eat first" bin in

your fridge.

- Freeze leftovers for later.
- Understand food labeling.

"Use by" and "Best used by" are mostly suggestions. Rely on sight, smell and your judgement to determine if something has gone bad. For more tips to reduce food waste and information, visit savethefood.org.



SAVE WATER

Use a rain sensor shut-off device to prevent water waste with your in-ground irrigation system. The state of Minnesota enacted a law in 2005 requiring that all automatically operated landscape irrigation systems include rainfall sensors. It requires that the sensor technology inhibits or interrupts the operation of the system during periods of sufficient moisture. If you have a timer on your irrigation system, make sure that you are not watering during the heat of the day, 10 a.m. – 5 p.m., as most of the water from your system will evaporate before soaking into the soil.

HOW MUCH WATER DO YOU USE?

There's a fun and easy way to see how "water wise" you are at home. Visit blm.mn/waterwise to see how your water habits impact the environment and your water bill. The results may surprise you. After filling in your information, you'll receive tips on a few ways to save water and money with small changes to your habits.
